Dear Leader Thune and Leader Schumer:

The purpose of this letter is to call to your attention a Social Security solvency plan released today by experts at the Brookings Institution. It is a centrist and thoughtful plan that also makes several key improvements to the Social Security program. While we may not agree with every single provision, we firmly believe this is excellent place from which Congress should start negotiations on restoring solvency to Social Security and encourage others who may differ with elements of this plan to come forward with their own.

We strongly recommend that action take place in as soon as possible as not only would it restore solvency to the Social Security system, but it would also significantly reduce our overall budget deficit and put the United States on a sustainable fiscal path. Reducing the deficit would lower interest costs, increase our gross domestic product, and increase household incomes.

This plan is balanced in that there are both revenue increases and benefit reductions. And it also would deal with potential workforce shortages. The plan is modelled after the 1983 Social Security amendments which achieved 50 years of solvency. Just like those amendments, we would urge Congress to significantly improve the supplemental security income program and reduce elderly poverty, which has increased by over 50 percent in the last four years.

This plan deserves the serious attention of Congress. The American public wants solvency to be restored to Social Security so that the 17 percent reduction in benefits when the trust funds are depleted does not take place.
